Hillside Park Vision and Values:

Principal's Report:

- **School Opening:** In the last five years, enrolment has increased by almost 10, 000 students. As our region's population expands, new families register within our system on an ongoing basis. At Hillside our current enrollment is at 200 students.
- Configuration & Staffing: New Staff include: M. Bond (P/1), A. Tingley (ECE), H. Boulilier (40% Coverage), V. Tacain (Librarian). As well as N. Humadi (EAL), C. Lee, D. Anderson (EPA), A. Malaya (EPA), J. Ytoc (EPA), A. Jennett (EPA), C. Rideout (Pysch).
- HRCE P-3 Literacy Initiative: The HRCE P-3 Literacy Initiative is a comprehensive strategy to improve early literacy for students in Primary to Grade 3. Key components include focusing on core literacy skills like oral language, reading, and writing, using a multi-tiered system of supports to provide individualized instruction, and administering a Grade 3 Literacy assessment to measure progress.
- Revised Curriculum 3-6 Curriculum: The Nova Scotia curriculum for grades 3-6 is being revised to focus on developing skills for a changing world, with a strong emphasis on English Language Arts and Essential Graduation Competencies. Key areas include foundational literacy skills, critical thinking, creativity, and communication across all subjects. The curriculum is designed to scaffold learning, with increasing complexity in tasks and texts from grade to grade, and integrates technology to support learning.
- Fact Fluency Priority: HRCE's fact fluency priority is concentrated on the development of computational fluency. This is achieved through a progression of learning that starts with understanding and using mental math strategies, and moves toward efficient computation for larger numbers. Key expectations include mastering basic facts, using strategies like doubling and the distributive property, and understanding concepts like the zero property of multiplication.
- <u>Continued Focus on Wellbeing and Equity:</u> Creating environments where everyone can thrive by addressing systemic barriers and ensuring fair access to resources through our schools SSP goals, the inclusive education policy, etc.
- Indigo Grant & Library Makeover: The 2025-2026 school year is our second year of the Indigo Love of Reading grant. Nine thousand dollars worth of books have been added to our Library shelves and students in all grade levels are enjoying the amazing new selection of books! Books with a focus on culturally responsive literature and non-fiction texts have been the largest focus. Staff and students have been collaborating to establish a nature themed Library makeover including new tables, shelving and murals.
- **SAC Innovation Grant:** The SAC Innovation Fund provides grants up to \$10,000 to SACs to support innovative ideas to support student achievement and well-being

and address real problems experienced by students and schools. This funding is intended to provide an opportunity to add value to the educational experience of students at their school. This year our school has received \$10,000 for an Interactive Storytelling and Digital Literacy Lab.

- **SAC Conference:** Ryanne (SAC Chair) and Jacqulyn will attend the conference on Nov 28th, 2025 to represent Hillside and our learning community.
- <u>Hillside 70th Anniversary:</u> Hillside Park was first constructed in 1956 and will be celebrating its 70th Anniversary this year! The goal is to have two events; an open house and large-scale Spring Fling in April and May to celebrate 70 years of Hillside Park. The Hillside PTG will be seeking donations from community businesses to help support these endeavors.
- **Building Security:** Fire drills, lockdown drills, and hold and secure drills, will take place throughout the year (3 in the fall, and 3 in the spring). Our table top relocation drill will be reviewed at our first staff meeting.
- <u>Safety in Schools:</u> Safety is a top priority in all schools throughout HRCE. The Nova Scotia Auditor General, Kim Adair, released her June 11th, 2024 Report to the House of Assembly. The audit examined incidents of violence in schools and how the Department of Education and Early Childhood Development, the Regional Centres for Education, and Conseil Scolaire Acadien provincial are maintaining the safety of their students and educators.
- <u>Code of Conduct:</u> The objective of the Provincial School Code of Conduct Policy (Code of Conduct) is to establish and maintain safe and inclusive learning and working environments in our school communities. The Code of Conduct establishes expectations for acceptable behaviour of children and students and provides guidance on how schools should respond to and accurately record incidents of unacceptable behaviour. The Code of Conduct supports well-being and achievement by promoting respect of the rights, property, and safety of all. It establishes predictable consequences and pathways for addressing unacceptable behaviour in schools, ensuring responses are clear, consistent, timely, restorative, and equitable. The policy can be found here: <u>Policy</u>
- **School Wide Matrix of Expectations:** A school-wide matrix of expectations provides a clear and consistent framework for behavior across all settings. It helps staff and students understand what is expected, promotes a positive school culture, and supports a safe, respectful, and inclusive learning environment.
- <u>Breakfast Baskets</u>: Each class has a basket of breakfast foods that classroom teachers will place within their classrooms every morning. Snacks will continue to be provided as needed at the office. A few staff and community volunteers have offered to do special breakfasts' like toast every few weeks.
- **Provincial Lunch Program:** This program will continue for the 2025-2026 school year. This program is a pay-what-you-can program, meaning families can choose to pay the full \$6.50 cost of the lunch, part of the cost, or nothing. All payment

- information is kept confidential. Lunch will start in schools on Sept. 15th, with ordering opening two weeks before the first lunches are served. Website: https://nslunch.ca/ The Lunch Lady will continue to be our lunch provider.
- **Provincial Cell Phone Policy**: Starting in the 2024-25 school year, all students must turn off their mobile devices and store them out of sight during instructional time. Limited exceptions, like junior high and high school teachers allowing cell phone use in class for instructional purposes, will be available.
- **Attendance and Engagement Policy:** The goal of this policy is to ensure students are in classes building their knowledge and lessening learning gaps.
- <u>Celebrating Students:</u> Fantastic Friday Phone Calls and Hillside High Five Assemblies will continue this year.

- Orange Shirt Day: Sept 26th This day is designed to commemorate the residential school experience, to witness and honour the healing journey of the survivors and their families, and to commit to the ongoing process of reconciliation.
- o Choir: Ms. Ripley-Davis will be directing choir on Thursdays at recess
- Milk Sports Fair: Oct. 16th Mr. Sutton has organized a trip for upper elementary students to attend the Milk Sports Fair. The Milk Sport Fair is a fully-interactive sporting event and an excellent opportunity for students to get active and learn about the many sport options available in Nova Scotia.

SAC Funds:

- It is noted that each school is given \$5,000.00 plus a dollar for every student within the school yearly, which is approximately \$5200 for the SAC at Hillside Park.
- This year's funding plus the carry-over from last year of \$3860 gives us approximately \$9000.00.
- SAC Members will vote for the use of funds for the 2025-26 school year.
