Student Success Plan:

Literacy Goal: We will improve student achievement in Literacy

Strategies: (assessment for learning, instruction and learning team focus)

High Impact Strategy 1: Teachers will use formative classroom assessment (conversations, observations, products) to develop responsive lessons for the whole class, small groups, and individual students.

Teachers will

- Use mentor texts as springboards for reading and writing workshop
- Widen our scope of genres in the writing workshop

NOTE:

- -Currently the admin team and the Librarian, Ms. Somers are working together to revamp the Library. Action steps include: completing a book auditit to ensure all texts are culturally responsive, creating a collection of teacher resources & materials. The goal within the learning commons area of the Library is to purchase flexible seating (floor rockers, benches, cozy rugs), add a makerspace, and overall transform the spaces to be more learner friendly.
- -Questions arose from parents about EAL support and the process for school allocations. The majority of allocations are based on student need or school population.
- -R.I.O (Remote Interpretation Ontario online translating services) was a suggested resource to help better translate between staff and students as well as from school to families. The admin team will inquire further about the program and its availability to be used within Nova Scotian schools.

Christina and Jacqulyn attended the SAC PD opportunity held on Nov. ___ The PD focused on the Inclusive Education Policy and how it connects to SSP. Overall, it was an informative session which highlighted the

lack of wellbeing & safety/trust learners in High Schools feel; specifically individuals from the LGBTQ+ community. This demonstrated the importance of providing our elementary students with the tools, language and resources they need to problem solve and cope with their emotions in a positive manner.

SAC Funds:

- Current SAC Balance \$13,607.76
- So far, new books have been purchased for learners in Gr. 3-5, which cost approximately \$2500.
- The admin team will be purchasing new leveled books for Gr. P-3 at an approximate cost of \$3000. Book Bureau money has also been invested into leveled books for learners in Gr. P-3 as well.
- Ideas for future spending:
 - Makerspace materials & resources
 - Flexible Seating for classrooms & library
 - Chromebook cart for downstairs classrooms; estimated cost of \$1700.

Principal's Report:

Recent Events:

• Professional Development Days

- <u>December 1st:</u> Treaty Education/Land Acknowledgment and Student Success Planning: Ms. Ripley-Davis lead staff in the singing of the Mi'kmaq friendship song, sharing of teacher resources, discussion of the Land Acknowledgement and importance of the word 'unceded'. Staff discussed the Student Success Planning (SSP) goals and action steps.
- <u>December 2:</u> Literacy (P-3) and Mathematics (4-5): Gr. P-3 teachers collaborated with Ms. Reid, discussing our learners strengths and areas for growth, as well as, the 6 Pillars of Effective Reading Instruction, and Phonological Awareness.
- <u>Holiday Concert</u> Students from Pre-Primary to Grade 5 participated in the school concert. Risers and sound equipment were rented to assist in the facilitation of the concert. Families donated \$386.45 towards the music program. Overall, there was a lot of positive feedback from families & the community. Families were excited to be participating in school-wide events once again.
- Author Visit (Jacqueline Halsey) Our second author visit took place on Dec 8th, 2022. Jacqueline Halsey showcased two of her books; (P-2) 'The Terrible Horrible Smelly Pirate,' and (3-5) Explosion Newsie. Learners enjoyed meeting the author, experiencing her texts and gaining some knowledge of her career as a writer.
- *Mad Science* Students in all grades experienced Mad Science on Dec 15th, 2022. Mad Science provided learners with an opportunity to enhance their scientific knowledge..
- **Breakfast Program** The majority of our fruit deliveries for the school breakfast program have been purchased from the Vegetorium. Learners are really enjoying the apples, pears and oranges. Students are encouraged to take items from the breakfast bins and always have access to the fruit bowl in the main office.

Upcoming Events:

• Taekwon-Do Workshop (Wednesday Jan 25th): Hiltz Taekwon-Do provided free workshops to all classes.

- Each workshop focused on mental and physical fitness and martial arts techniques.
- Family Literacy Day (Fri, Jan 27): Each class will enjoy a fun filled day of reading. Students are invited to wear their PJ's and bring their favorite stuffie to read with. Ms. Reid will visit each class and share a read-aloud, some classes will participate in additional literacy activities/games and the admin team will provide all staff and students with Hot Chocolate and Candy Canes.
- Maritime Centre for African Dance Workshop (Friday Feb 3rd): Each class will take part in a session of African dance and music.
- Rocks n' Rings (Curling Wednesday Feb 15th): Students will participate in a variety of relays and team-building activities while learning about the sport of curling.
- <u>PERFORM</u> African Dance (Monday March 6th) & Physical Theatre (Tuesday March 21 Tuesday April 25 @ lunch): PERFORM is a subsidy program that helps connect schools with professional artists. By integrating performing arts into educational programming students can further develop their confidence, creative thinking and problem solving.
- <u>Drum Club</u> (Tuesdays & Thursdays @ recess) Ms. Ripley-Davis has organized a djembe drum club for students in Gr. 2-5; playing a variety of rhythms in hopes of performing at the Feb. High Five Awards assembly.
- *Great Big Crunch Grant* Application has been submitted. Notification of grant approval will be sent in mid Feb.
- **Breakfast & Books** Nutrition Month Grant application has been submitted (\$750.00). Breakfast & Books will occur on March 10th. It will include a whole school breakfast and books being read to students either during the meal on the projector or in small reading groups afterwards.
- <u>African Heritage Month</u> Classroom teachers will collaborate with learners to develop great understanding of African Nova Scotian and Black history within Nova Scotia and Canada.
- Nova Scotia Heritage Day Feb 20th, 2023 (No School)
- <u>Valentine's Day</u> Students will participate in stations that will focus on wellbeing and friendship. Each class will have a celebration in the afternoon.

Grants:

- *Pitsco Grant (\$350)* Application Submitted. Kubo Coding ++ Single Bundle was requested to build upon our school's makerspace.
- Active Smart Kids (ASK) Grant \$500.00

• *Classroom Wish List Funds:* There is still a balance of \$1,265.06 as some staff haven't purchased items for their classrooms yet (\$150/teacher).

New Business:
