Students are welcome to exchange Valentine's Day cards and teachers will provide their classes with some treats in the afternoon!


Celebrate African Heritage Month!


Hillside Park is in for a huge treat on Friday, February 3rd! We are excited to welcome the Maritime Centre for African Dance, a local organization dedicated to teaching, sharing, and promoting African culture through the art of dance. Our workshops will focus on African dance, drumming, afrobeats, and storytelling!







The African Nova Scotian flag was designed in 2012 by local Halifax artist and educator, Wendie L. Wilson. Her hope for the flag was that it would inspire African Nova Scotians to develop unity, explore their history and cultural identity and share their experiences with others.



The symbol at the flag's centre is Wilson's own interpretation of the West African Adinkra symbol, "Sankofa", meaning "go back and fetch it". The Sankofa bird represents the spirit of African Nova Scotians, a resilient people who have never forgotten their history and continue to build on the lessons of the past in order to create a new future.

Wilson's version incorporates a wave, representing the ocean and our ancestors' journey through the Middle Passage. The wave is also symbolic of our tie to the water here in Nova Scotia. There is also half of a heart representing "heartbreak balanced with awareness."

Lockdown Drill

The safety and security of our students and staff is a top priority for Hillside Park Elementary School and the Halifax Regional Centre for Education. We have been implementing a number of measures as part of a comprehensive plan aimed at ensuring our school remains a safe place for our students to learn. One of the procedures our school will be practicing is a lockdown drill.

During a lockdown drill, classroom doors are secured and the students remain inside the room until instructed by the teacher to resume their activities. All exterior doors are locked and no one is permitted to enter or leave the building. Students are kept inside the school and classrooms when circumstances make it safer to stay in the classroom rather than evacuate.

We practice these drills to ensure our school remains a safe place for teaching and learning. Our next lockdown drill will be during the week of February 13-17.

Please continue to regularly check family members for head lice. Please let the school administration know if we can help. A child with head lice may return to school after the first treatment. Please know that head lice is a common occurrence and we can all work together to minimize the effects.
